## 1929 Grand Family

2:00 P.M. Worthy Matrons of Milwaukee County entered from the north and Worthy Patrons from the south, carrying yellow chrysanthemums. They formed an archway on each side of the altar through which Grand Officers passed.

Marathon Chapter exemplified the opening of a subordinate chapter under the new ritual, including the presentation of the Flag, introduction of visitors, examination of visitors, balloting and closing. Questions from the floor and answers by the Grand Lecturer followed.

Grand Patron:

Another event long to be remembered by me was the party my home chapter (Marathon) gave in honor of the Grand Patron, October 29th. I wish to record my thanks for and appreciation of their kindness. I also wish to thank all the Grands and Past Grands who came to Wausau at that time.
